Goals and Objectives of the Course:

This is a one-semester survey of calculus primarily for students in the biological or life sciences. It includes a non-theoretical treatment of differential and integral calculus and a brief introduction to differential equations, with applications to the life sciences. Three lectures given weekly by a faculty member are complemented by two small group discussions led by TA. Students desiring a one-semester terminal calculus course may take this class; life science students wanting a more thorough course or planning to take mathematics beyond first-year calculus should take instead the traditional calculus sequence Math:1850-Math:1860 (22M:025-22M:026). By the end of this course you should have improved logic skills, be an expert at pre-calculus and have learned basis calculus. Prerequisite: Math:1440 (22M:015) or satisfactory score on math replacement exam.

Textbook: Greenwell, Ritchey, Lial — Calculus for the Life Sciences 2015, Pearson, Second Edition **Required Equipment:** No calculators are allowed for the exams.

Grading: We will use norm-based grading according to the recommendation of the grade distribution given by CLAS (see below)
